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Student Honors and Activities

Undergraduate student Matthew Scaccia (Parks, Recreation and Tourism) was chosen to attend the Conservation Leaders for Tomorrow (CLfT) conference in Vermont this September. CLfT is a professional development program that focuses on conservation education and hunting awareness. It is a four-day workshop that blends interactive classroom discussion with field experiences, giving participants an opportunity to engage with leading natural resource professionals and conservationists.

SFR's **Binod Neupane** was one of 10 Ph.D. students from around the world selected to attend a special summer course on sustainability for coupled human and natural systems organized by the University of Hokkaido in Japan. While there, Binod participated in a poster session describing his research. In June, Binod won the best 1st Time NAC-SETAC Poster Presentation award at the North Atlantic Chapter of the Society for Environmental Toxicology and Chemistry conference in Rhode Island.

Yucheng Peng won 1st place in the 2012 Forest Product Society (FPS) Wood Award competition for a paper he authored. The Wood Award is intended to recognize and honor outstanding research conducted by graduate students in the field of wood science and wood products. The Wood Award is the most prestigious FPS award for graduate research.

At the Society of Plastics Engineers' (SPE) Automotive Composites Conference and Exhibition (ACCE), graduate student Alper Kiziltas received the SPE ACCE Graduate Scholarship and the Best Poster award. Each year, only two students in the U.S. are selected for this scholarship through a rigorous process based upon each student's



research.

Drs. Jeff Benjamin and Rob Lilieholm received tenure and Jeff was promoted to Associate Professor. Congratulations Jeff and Rob.

A publication co-authored by Professor Stephen Shaler has received both the First Place George Marra Award for Excellence in Writing and the Markwardt Wood Engineering Award. These awards by the Society of Wood Science and Technology (SWST) and the Forest Products Society (FPS) will be presented in Beijing, China, and Washington, D.C., at each organization's annual conventions.

Professor Douglas Gardner has been elected as a Fellow in the Society of Wood Science and Technology (SWST), and was recognized for this honor at the SWST Annual Meeting in Beijing, China, in August. To qualify as a Fellow one must have offered significant contributions to the SWST and the profession of wood science and technology.

Director's Welcome Welcome to another issue of *Branching* Out. It has been an unusually dynamic summer and fall for the school. The renovation of Nutting Hall is nearly complete and it looks fantastic. New siding, roof, windows and insulation have transformed the building. Construction of the new Barbara Wheatland Geospatial

Analysis Laboratory is underway, and Plum Creek has generously endowed the interior renovation of Room 204 — our most widely used conference room.

At our awards ceremony last spring, 58 students received \$220,000 in scholarships from more than 60 named funds. The George Houston Scholarship alone provided \$103,000 — nearly doubling our awards. Albro Cowperthwaite, Jr. (1976 B.S. in Parks Management) received the Distinguished Alumni Award in recognition of his long career promoting recreation and tourism in Maine's North Woods. And, a very generous donation by Dr. Robert J. Weir and Jane Carter Weir will establish a new Forest Resources Professorship in coming years.

Last spring, we conferred 35 B.S. degrees (up 20 percent from the past 5-year average), and 20 graduate degrees (18 masters and two Ph.D's., double the 5-year average). We also have one of the largest incoming classes in years — 32 new students. Dr. Jeff Benjamin was awarded tenure and promoted to the rank of Associate Professor, and Dr. Rob Lilieholm was awarded tenure. Congratulations to Jeff and Rob. Unfortunately, Drs. Jeremy Wilson and Anthony Halog left UMaine to pursue other career options, and Dr. Tom Brann retired. All positions are being replaced — including one in Nature-Based Tourism to strengthen our Parks, Recreation and Tourism Program; and a new position in Carbon and Climate Dynamics in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service. Finally, after several years of planning, this fall we initiated the new curricula for our three new majors.

Nutting Hall Renovations

here are some big changes in Nutting Hall this Fall as a large renovation project is underway. **L** Construction began May 7 and is scheduled to be completed October 20. So far, 584 windows have been replaced, exterior wall systems have been insulated, new siding has been applied, and buttresses have been modified. A higher R-value insulation has been installed on the roof, as well as a new roof system. The old and outdated ventilation system has been removed from the roof and a new, more efficient ventilation system has been installed. Nutting's main auditorium has new trusses to reinforce the roof, as well as new heating, air conditioning and ventilation systems. Over 40 new heating zones can be found throughout the building, and 2nd floor offices have been provided with the duct work needed to install individual out-of-window AC units if desired. A new fire alarm system is in place to ensure the highest level of safety.

Plans for the renovations continue into the Spring Semester when students and faculty will gather on Maine Day, April 24 2013, to plant nearly 100 native tree species around the building for use as an outdoor classroom. Alumni, family and friends are welcome to participate.

SFR Hosts Envirothon Field Day

This past April, set amongst the trees at the Demeritt Forest, students from over 30 high schools in the state attended a Field Day for Envirothon — a competition sponsored by the NRCS Soil and Water Conservation District. The competition tests students' knowledge and skills related to forestry, wildlife, aquatics and soils. Students traverse from station-to-station to take a written and/or oral exam on each core subject area, and the team with the highest total score wins the State Meet with an option to compete at the National Meet. SFR hosted a regional competition in 2011 and the state competitions in 2009 and 2012, as well as many Fall Field Days. At each of the past seven state competitions, SFR has awarded a scholarship to a student newly enrolled in an SFR major. Professor Bill Livingston has generously contributed his time to the program, with the help of undergraduate and graduate students in SFR. The most recent Fall Field Day was held October 11, 2012 at Demeritt Forest.

SFR Student Scholarship Ceremony Awards over \$200,000

The School of Forest Resources Student Awards Ceremony held in April of 2012 was a huge success, with over \$200,000 in scholarship money distributed among current and incoming students. There were over 100 people in attendance, including award recipients and their guests, faculty and staff, donors and distinguished alumni. In all, 32 undergraduate students received awards, as well as seven graduate and 10 incoming students.



Cooperative Forestry Research Unit

The Cooperative Forestry Research Unit (CFRU), housed within the Center for Research on Sustainable Forests, is supported by over 30 of Maine's largest forest landowners, managers and wood processors representing over 8.3 million acres of forestland. Since 1975 these stakeholders have been working with scientists to solve some of the most

pressing issues facing the industry, beginning with the spruce budworm outbreak of the 1970s and 1980s. Today's CFRU research projects are diverse and explore various aspects of silviculture, forest growth and yield, and wildlife habitat. As in years past, the CFRU continues to rely on a large crew of student workers each summer to carry out field research around the state. Many SFR alumni can include a summer working on a CFRU field crew as part of their early forestry experience.

In Memoriam

Edward S. Connors, Class of 1980

A longtime employee of Superior Paper Co. in Bangor, Edward Connors was also a cherished husband, son, father, papa, brother and friend to all. At the time of his death, he was employed by C & L Aviation Services. He embraced life to the fullest. He valued family and friends and was a devoted caregiver to his loving wife of 27 years. Ed was also known as the mayor of the neighborhood in his hometown of Hermon, Maine.

George D. Carlisle, Class of 1935

George Carlisle notably served as treasurer, president and chairman of Prentiss & Carlisle Co. — a Bangor-based timberland owner and management company. He was a loyal and generous alumnus of the University of Maine and served on the University of Maine Foundation. George received an honorary Doctor of Science from UMaine in 1986, along with the prestigious Black Bear Award and the A.D. Nutting Award. SFR and the Maine forestry community will be forever indebted for his leadership, generosity and service.



2012 Acadian Internship has Global Reach

C ixteen interns from the U.S. and eight other Scountries took part in the 2012 Acadian Internship in Regional Conservation held at the Schoodic Education and Research Center (SERC) in Acadia National Park. The program combines formal coursework with a four-week paid internship assisting various nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) across Downeast Maine and southwest New Brunswick. Under the leadership of SFR's Dr. Rob Lilieholm, students from Brazil, Ethiopia, the U.K., Hungary, Ireland, Lebanon, Oman, Palestine and the U.S. received instruction in conservation theory, tools and methods from a diverse set of faculty, local experts and guest lecturers. Participating NGOs included the Downeast Lakes Land Trust, Downeast Salmon Federation, Frenchman Bay Conservancy, Maine Sea Grant, Maine Coast Heritage Trust, Marine Environmental Research Institute, and The Nature Trust of New Brunswick. The program wrapped-up with formal project presentations and a fund-raiser attended by nearly 200 people featuring "Bert and I" humorists Bob Bryan and Tim Sample.

"[The Acadian Internship] is one of the premier opportunities in North America for students motivated to gain hands-on experience with the emerging large landscape conservation paradigm," says **James N. Levitt,** Director of the Program on Conservation Innovation at the Harvard Forest, Harvard University and Chair of the Executive Committee of the Quebec-Labrador Foundation/Atlantic Center for the Environment.

The Acadian Internship Program is a partnership of the Quebec-Labrador Foundation, the Schoodic Education and Research Center Institute, the University of Maine, and Acadia National Park.
